Fruit Snack

Please can we remind you that snacks at break time should consists of fruit. We have had a few children asking the school for food at this time. Please can I ask you to talk with your child about whether they would want fruit break and provide this if necessary. While we will always have emergency provisions, we do not have the capacity to provide for all children.

In Year 3, we've been learning some roman numerals this week and comparing multiples in maths. In writing, we have learned about mummification (including role play) and have started writing a set of instructions in our own words.

This week in year 4 we started exploring our new book for our English unit called 'Escape to Pompeii.' The children have enjoyed learning all about the Roman city and what happened there. This book links well with our new topic of the Romans where we have started to timeline the Roman empire and explore key events that took place there. We have enjoyed making our own mosaics in Art. In maths we have been exploring x by 10 and 100 and started our new class read "I am Lion".

In Year 5, we have been looking at multiplying and dividing by 10, 100 and 1,000. The children have worked brilliantly to show their thinking—something that will really come in handy when we move on to more complicated calculations. In our writing sessions, we have started our new text, Erik the Viking. We have only read the first chapter and we are keen to find out what happens next!

The Year 6s have settled brilliantly back into school this week, well done to you all. We have started a new writing unit, creating a spooky atmosphere in our monster narratives. We've been working with fractions in maths, converting the denominators and comparing different amounts. In art we have started to look at the links between art and religion, focusing this week on the representation of pattern in Islamic art-works and even had a go at making our own.
